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Suncorp Police Scholarship winner to enhance disaster mitigation and resilience

Commissioner Stewart said Senior Sergeant Barwick would travel to the UK, Germany and Spain to conduct his important research. He will also undertake a two week Disaster Management Course at Bournemouth University, England.

"With potential increases in disasters, such as more frequent flooding and cyclones, as well as human-caused events, like derailments and fires, there is a need to increase our abilities to effectively model and warn vulnerable communities of pending disasters," Commissioner Stewart said

Now in its third year, the scholarship focuses on crime prevention, road safety or disaster management preparedness, response and recovery, and can be undertaken in Australia or overseas.

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
